Annual Plan Update 2016/17

- what Council has coming up, including work for community plans

We've just finished consulting on our Annual Plan 2016/17 with Councillors due to make their decisions later this month and then formally adopt the plan at the end of June. A lot of the information in the plan is about changes in timing to projects such as rural water treatment upgrades and when work might start on the Hina Hina Bridge or sealing the Nuggets Road. Two of the bigger issues are how to improve the stormwater drainage in Taieri Mouth and how we should deal with dust suppression on our local roads. At the same time, we asked our residents and ratepayers if they thought we should extend the liquor ban in central Balclutha and what they thought about proposed changes to our dog control bylaw and policy. Thank you to those who made a submission. We'll keep you posted on the outcomes in the coming weeks.

As many of you will know, promoting growth and investment in the district is one of Council's key platforms. Closely linked with our Living and Working Strategy is the development of community plans, which will determine the projects and priorities for each community. The plans will include how we can action the Living and Working Strategy in each place and the development of a single management plan for all the parks and reserves in one community. They will also review how Council invests in community facilities such as halls and social housing or housing for the elderly, plus much more. Some additional work by Council now means that both Balclutha, Milton and Waihola's community plans will be developed simultaneously with this planning work a focus for the 2016/17 year. Community plans for other places will follow.



Impressive is an apt word to describe Kaitangata's new skate park. It's also a good description of the community's hard work to make the project happen. Funded by a grant from Council and community fundraising efforts the new park is a great addition to the already popular BMX park in Kaitangata.

Building Guidelines for Customers

Council is reviewing our responsiveness to customers in the Building Department. Currently we are trying to be so immediately responsive that we aren't being efficient in everything else we are doing and that isn't fair to those customers. While we are in the review process please consider the following:

Building and Plumbing Inspections

We've had a number of situations where customers request building or plumbing inspections on the same day as they are needed and while we aim to provide prompt services this expectation is not always practical due to time constraints. We would recommend contractors and owners give us 24 hours prior notice to ensure we can get our inspector on site when you require it. The 2004 Building Act notes the owner or occupier must give assistance to enable the inspector to view all necessary parts of the building or building work in a reasonable timeframe.

Property Sale Deadlines

If you are buying a house or building will need a fire report showing all we recommend you apply for a Land means of escape, occupancy numbers and any fire safety provisions e.g. exit signage and emergency lighting that purchase any property. Recently there have been situations where agents and owners have left checking www building govt nz

Council records until just before the sale deadline date only to find severaoutstanding issues that they were not aware of. This puts more pressure on our staff and you, our customer, so prepare early. LIMs can take up to 10 working days to process and we also have an urgent service available for 2-3 working days when required.

Questions for Building Inspectors

While we make every attempt to have building inspectors available for counter enquiries sometimes their schedules can be very busy and we would advise to ring ahead and book an appointment to save some disappointment, especially if you are traveling a considerable distance to see us.

Marquees

Corporate events, show days, sports days and special occasions - if you require a marquee consent then remember to apply early as these can take up to 20 working days to process. If your marquee is over 100m2 or is to be located on a site for more than one month then consent is required. We will need a fire report showing all means of escape, occupancy numbers and any fire safety provisions e.g. exit signage and emergency lighting that meet the 'Protection from Fire' requirements - these can be found at www.building.govt.nz.




Staff Changes

Since our last newsletter, we have welcomed new staff members Gabrielle Pearman in the Risk Management Support Officer role, Barbara Belvoir as Senior Projects Engineer, Stephen Gordon Capital Delivery Manager and Whale Hayley as our Administration Assistant. Meanwhile we've bid farewell to Ray Bremer our Building Control Manager after two and a half years in the role. We've also said good-bye (sort of!) to Building Inspector Ivan Coutts, who has retired after many years working in the district but will still be helping out on a casual basis.

Resident Survey

The Resident Survey for 2015 was conducted during November with 333 residents giving their views. There were positive ratings for Council's overall performance, advice and helpfulness of staff and ease of lodging a service request. The top scorer was with 100% library services satisfaction levels. Service and information centres came in a close second. Residents were also asked about Council's goal promote growth with a satisfaction result of 89% - a pleasing answer given the priority Council's growth strategies were given in last year's Long Term Plan. However, Council received lower ratings for how well a service request or issue was handled and resolved. Also ranking near the bottom was satisfaction with the maintenance of local gravel roads, however its score of 56% was an improvement on last year. Council uses the survey to gather feedback about our services, gauge information projects, to provide about accountability in our reporting and to see what further work needs to be done.

Balclutha Bridge and Flood Bank Accessways



Pedestrians wanting to access the river bank near the Balclutha bridge will find it much easier with the construction of two new pathways. A gravel pathway now runs under the bridge at its southern end connecting the two cattle stops that were installed last year, while at the northern end, a gravel pathway runs underneath the bridge connecting the carpark on Barnego Road with the Strang Reserve pedestrian access. Service Delivery Group Manager Jules Witt said the main motivation for building the new paths was to make it easier for walkers, school children, sightseers and other users.

"It means people using the river banks or footpaths on the bridge no longer have to try and cross State Highway 1 or find a way under the bridge, instead there is a clearly marked gravel path." Hopefully these new paths, plus the access ways onto the flood bank installed last year by way of cattle stops mean more people can enjoy the river, and in safer manner, Mr Witt said. Council is aware that there were a couple of teething issues when the cattle stops were first installed, such as one sheep becoming stuck. However, we are no longer getting reports of any problems.

Each team had to give an eight minute presentation on their project along with a 1000 word summary. As the supreme winner, West Otago Health received \$4000 in prize money, a \$1000 consultancy voucher and the trophy.
